

## SEN. BEN NELSON

D-NEB.

**Total assets:** \$6.7 million to \$14.1 million

» Nelson sold between \$550,000 and \$1.1 million of Berkshire Hathaway stock last February. He also reported new purchases of the stock worth a total of \$245,000 to \$600,000.

» On his previous report, Nelson said his wife owned \$1 million to \$5 million in Berkshire stock. Now he reports only that her Berkshire holdings are "over \$1 million." Lawmakers have that less specific option for a spouse's assets.

» Nelson has an uncompensated position on the board of advisers for Columbus, Neb.-based Behlen Manufacturing Co. and owns \$500,000 to \$1 million worth of Behlen stock.



## SEN. MIKE JOHANNIS

R-NEB.

**Total assets:** \$2.2 million to \$5.3 million

» Johannis donated to charity a total of \$850 in speaking fees from speeches he gave to the Lincoln Legatus Group and the National Catholic Rural Life Conference in Des Moines.

» Alltel, Verizon and Cellco Partnership each paid the senator's wife more than \$1,000 in earned income. She works with state and local governments for the telecommunications companies.

» Johannis received a gift from the Standing Bear Foundation — a bust of Standing Bear worth \$1,500.



## REP. LEE TERRY

R-NEB.

**Total Assets:** \$61,000 to \$396,000

» Terry has various investment accounts for each of his three sons, Jack, Nolan and Ryan.

» Terry also reported credit card debt of \$15,000 to \$50,000. That included his personal credit card and a credit card he uses for campaign expenditures. The balances of both have since been paid off.

» Terry purchased between \$15,000 and \$50,000 worth of Berkshire Hathaway stock in May 2009.



## REP. JEFF FORTENBERRY

R-NEB.

**Total Assets:** \$655,000 to \$1.43 million

» Fortenberry's actual wealth is less than it appears because those asset figures include his northern Virginia townhouse, worth between \$500,000 and \$1 million. Fortenberry had to report the house because he rented part of it out. He has

two mortgages on the property totaling between \$519,000 and \$554,000.

» His total assets also include the share he and his wife have in Gloria Deo Inc. book and gift stores in Omaha and Lincoln.



## REP. ADRIAN SMITH

R-NEB.

**Total Assets:** \$179,000 to \$560,000

» Smith's assets include a mini-storage facility, My Other Garage, in Gering, Neb., that's worth \$100,000 to \$250,000. Smith owes Valley Bank and Trust in Gering between \$50,000 and \$100,000 in connection with the business.

» Smith is a member of three boards: Leadership Institute's Congressional Advisory Board, the Nebraska State Historical Society Foundation and ThankUSA's Congressional Advisory Board.



## SEN. CHUCK GRASSLEY

R-IOWA

**Total Assets:** \$2.4 million to \$6 million

» That includes \$1.8 million to \$3.8 million worth of farmland in Butler County, Iowa.

» Grassley is an honorary advisory board member of two groups: Partnership for a Drug Free Iowa-Face It Together and Iowans for Right to Work.

» His wife received more than \$1,000 in salary from Chambers, Conlon and Hartwell, a Washington-based lobbying firm.



## SEN. TOM HARKIN

D-IOWA

**Total assets:** \$10.4 million to \$23.1 million

» Harkin owns a vacation property in Hopetown, Abaco, in the Bahamas worth between \$500,000 and \$1 million, which he had to list because he received between \$15,000 and \$50,000 in rent from it.

» Most of Harkin's assets are held by his wife, a former senior vice president for government relations at United Technologies Corp. His net worth could be larger than it appears because she lists her holdings in United Technologies only as "over \$1 million."

» Three companies, Conoco Phillips, United Technologies Corp. and forestry giant AbitibiBowater Inc. each paid his wife more than \$1,000.



## REP. STEVE KING

R-IOWA

**Total assets:** \$130,000 to \$350,000

» Most of those assets are tied up in the family construction business, King Construction.

» King last year took seven trips sponsored by various groups, including the Heritage Foundation, Club for Growth, Judicial Watch, Eagle Forum and Americans for Fair Taxation. Among them, he took two trips to Germany, one sponsored by the German Marshall Fund, the other by the Association of Former Members of Congress. On one of those trips abroad, he took a family member.
